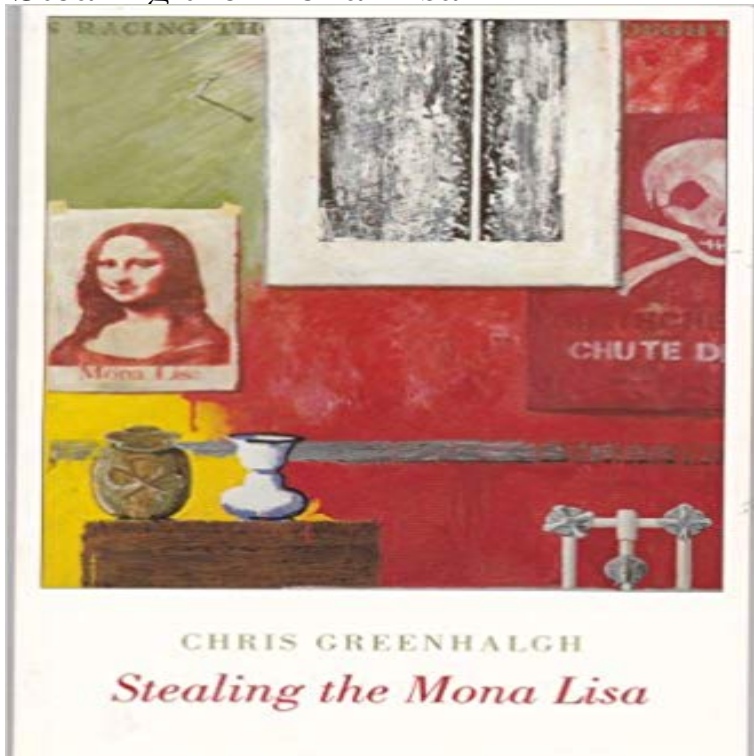


## Stealing the Mona Lisa
