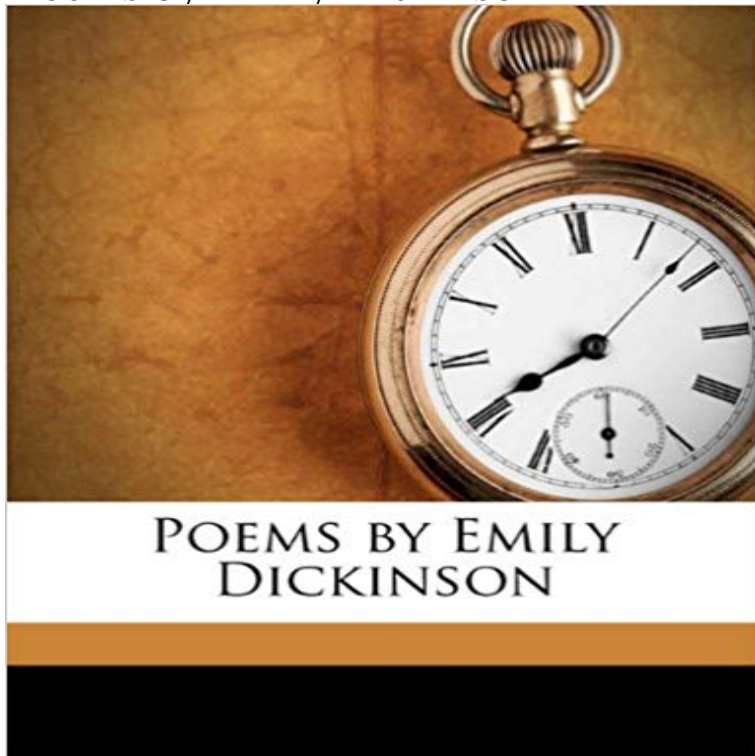


Poems by Emily Dickinson

The first volume of her work was published posthumously in 1890 and the last in 1955. She died in Amherst in 1886. **A narrow Fellow in the Grass (1096) by Emily Dickinson Poetry** looks at the life of reclusive poet Emily Dickinson, an artist who never saw success while alive. Shes known posthumously for **The Poetry of Emily Dickinson. Complete Poems of 1924**. Going through eleven editions in less than two years, the poems eventually extended far beyond their first household audiences.
